This multiple is made up of the silkscreen reproduction on a board of the portrait of Raymond Roussel - divided into a sixty-four-unit grid of alternating dark and light squares - thus recalling a chessboard. In Paolini's own words: "In addition to being a sublime writer, Roussel was also a chess connoisseur (a game that has always fascinated me even though I don't know the rules). Hence the choice of associating his image to that of the chessboard. Roussel looks at us through the pattern of the grid, remaining unattainable". ${ }^{\text {. }}$
