

La città proibita [The Forbidden City], 1990

Visible against the background of an ancient view of the Italian city of Alessandria in Piedmont is the design by Claude-Nicolas Ledoux for a city with an elliptical plan in Chaux (1771-79), framed by a white passepartout. The French architect's "ideal city" serves as a core that generates four spherical bodies, distributed across planes that differ with respect to the passepartout: three cosmic spheres and, to the left, the spherical architecture of the project for the *Houses of the Guard* (ca. 1790) also by Ledoux. Through the title – evoking the Forbidden City of Peking, that is, the Imperial Palace of the Ming and Qing dynasties built from 1406 to 1420 – Ledoux's "ideal city" becomes an inaccessible place and an original model, of which the four spheres seem to disseminate a distant echo.
