Silkscreen and pencil on Fabriano Rosaspina paper Nine parts 50 x 70 cm each, overall dimensions when displayed 160 x 220 cm Edition of 60 in Arabic numerals plus 15 in Roman numerals Marco Noire Editore, Turin

The nine parts produce a large "painting" inhabited by four valets wearing eighteenth-century costumes arranged along the diagonals. The valets – which in Paolinian language represent "dressers", discreet witnesses to

the act of the performance – offer the details of astronomical maps that respectively illustrate the stars "Pictor" and "Sculptor" (the latter is

part of the constellation "Phoenix", mentioned in the title of the print). The vanishing point, hinted at in pencil in the area corresponding to the diagonals, intersects at the centre with a square of the same dimensions as the star charts; this square, in turn, contains a small cutout square, a sort

of vanishing point towards an unlimited space, or, on the contrary, a blind "window".
